Something old, something new this Easter at St Francis

Make a note now of our Easter celebrations! We have some inspiring services planned.

On Maundy Thursday 17th April at 7pm in St Francis, our enabler the Rev Chris will lead a relaxed Eucharist which will include the washing of feet.
